- * Paul was known by different names in the Bible. His Jewish name was Saul, but in Latin, it was Paul.
- * Paul was a Hebrew from the tribe of Benjamin. (Philippians 3:5)
- * Paul was a Pharisee (Philippians 3:5-6)
- * Paul began following Jesus after a vision that blinded him (Acts 9)
- * Paul was a citizen of Rome because he was born in the Roman province of Tarsus. (Acts 22:28)

Paul began the church in Philippi by teaching people there about Jesus. A woman named Lydia was one of these people that were part of the church in Philippi. (Act 1611-15)


